Census Dates etc. – British Isles

The census across the British Isles happens on the same day, but countries within the United Kingdom are split into the following:

- England and Wales
 - 1939 National Registration Act (see page 3)
- Scotland
 - 1939 National Registration Act (see page 3)
- Ireland (see page 5 & 6)

Each time the Government wished to undertake a census; it was required to be approved by Parliament who then approved the legislation which outlined the details of a specific census. This happened from 1801 with the Population Act 1800, every decade until 1920, when the Census Act made it possible for the Government to hold a census at any time, but not within five years of the previous census.

- **1931 26th April** (England & Wales) and destroyed by enemy action in 1942. The 1931 Census in Scotland was stored in Edinburgh and therefore not subject to the fire that affected the 1939 Census for England and Wales.

1939 National Registration Act (1939 Register) – This took place on **29 September 1939**. It was designed to capture a picture of **civilians** in the run up to the Second World War. Information captured in this document was used in a variety of way, some of which were not linked to the second world war.

- Production of Identity Cards
- Issuance of Ration Books (January 1940)
- Introduction of the National Health Service in 1948, where this became the **NHS Central Register** following the (It was updated right up to 1991 and therefore captures surname changes caused by marriage)

Military personnel are not included.

The National Registration Act 1939 was repealed in 1952.

Ancestry does also have the same dataset, but it is updated much less frequently.

The **1939 Register in Scotland** was not digitised under the same agreement with FMP. Instead, it is located at the National Records for Scotland (NRS). All census date take place on a Sunday

- There are two Records Offices & Archives covering the Island of Ireland:
 - Public Records Office of Northern Ireland (PRONI) this is the location for material for the six Irish Counties that make up Norther Ireland -<u>https://www.nidirect.gov.uk</u>
 - National Archives of Ireland this is the location for material relating to the rest of Ireland from the beginning of the Irish State (1922) until circa 1987 <u>https://nationalarchives.ie</u>
 - (As, an aside, I always recommend those researching in Ireland to search the catalogues of both PRONI & National Archives of Ireland
 - Government Census has been taken of the Irish population every 10 years, commencing in **1821 until 1911**.
 - No Census in Ireland was taken in 1921 because of the unrest, leading to the War of Independence and Civil War. The next Census in Ireland was in 1926.


